### WHAT DO I NEED TO KNOW?

- This course will focus on promoting an understanding of human trafficking within the refugee population specifically in Italy.
- Participate in service activities in a non-profit setting in order to understand the challenges faced by both the organization and the people it serves.
- Participate in city tours of Rome, Naples and Sorrento.
- In Rome, students will stay in hotels and in Sorrento students will stay in apartments.
- Students will be enrolled in the following three (3) credit UMD course: CCJS458B.
- Scholarships available for CCJS students!
